# Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy (CEWS) Extended!

# Federal government extends CEWS to December 2020

As businesses continue to re-open and bring back their employees, the government's focus remains on helping businesses keep their employees employed while regaining financial stability. The Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy (CEWS) covers 75% of wages, up to a weekly maximum of \$847 for employees of eligible companies and non-profit organizations affected by the economic slowdown caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The wage subsidy, set to expire at the end of August 2020, has now been extended to December 2020. Currently, in order to meet the eligibility requirements to receive the wage subsidy, business owners must show a 30% reduction in revenue. New revenue-reduction thresholds are expected to be announced in the following weeks.

## **Ontario enters Stage 3 of Re-opening Framework**

For many regions of the province, nearly all businesses and public spaces will reopen in Stage 3, starting this Friday, July 17<sup>th</sup>, 2020. Gathering limits will increase to the following for those regions entering Stage 3:

- Indoor gatherings maximum of 50 people
- Outdoor gatherings maximum of 100 people

Regions remaining in Stage 2 will maintain the gathering limit of 10 people.

**Note:** gathering limits are subject to physical distancing requirements. A twometer distance must still be maintained. If physical distancing is not possible, wearing a mask is required.

#### Masks are now mandatory

- Wearing a mask or face covering is now required in indoor spaces that are accessible to the public in several districts across the province.
- Those who cannot cover their face due to religious or health reasons do not have to wear a mask.
- Businesses are not required to turn away customers who are not wearing a mask, but businesses, organizations and public transit have the right to deny entry.
- Both the public health unit and municipal bylaw officers can enforce these requirements.
